Ritsue Mishima (b. 1962 Kyoto) is a Japanese-Italian artist working in Venetian glass. Mishima moved to Venice in 1989 and having established a residence in Kyoto in 2011, she lives and works between the two cities.

The autodidact uses exclusively colourless glass and her work stands as a sampler of old glass-blowing and innovative decorating techniques, with strikingly rough, sometimes ornate surfaces. Working with the tradition of see-through cristallo glass which was invented in Murano in 1450, the artist takes advantage of the translucency and viscosity of Venetian glass in order to create clear glass sculptures, which bear the contours of light while becoming parts of the environments. "Transparency contains all colours," Mishima has said of her choice to eschew the colourful Murano glass tradition. While working in the Murano tradition, Mishima adds a delicate Japanese minimalism to this legacy, oscillating between light, matter, natural and artificial processes. Mishima's glass sculptures are thus a hybrid of Eastern and Western traditions.

Mishima came to glassmaking over detours. Her artistic career began in 1982 as a designer for Japanese advertising firms, expanding her creative range in 1987 by combining installations and flowers. In the same year, she became enthralled by Murano glass and moved to Venice in 1996. Her fruitless search for an ideal vase inevitably led her to design her own. Her first attempts resulted in very classical forms: elaborate and at the same time graceful designer vases on a foot, exceptionally well suited to arranging flowers. Mishima's traditional vases soon evolved into more abstract objects, a personal style becoming apparent; the vases developed increasingly in the direction of objects, they became larger and heavier, and many vases attracted attention for their technical perfection and visual emphasis.

Her abstract, organically inspired forms develop naturally, without a prescribed plan, as she creates clay models simultaneously while glassblowers create her pieces. Mishima follows every single step of the production and continually intervenes to bring the design to life. She also uses classical Venetian hot decorative techniques, such as wings formed with pincers. Only after detailed reworking in the annealed state is each piece considered finished. Mishima invests a lot of energy in working out the surface structures and three-dimensional decoration; many pieces are cut in detail or polished so that the light appears differently each time, in an attempt to convey the luminosity of the Venetian lagoon that inspires her work.

Mishima has collaborated with renowned glass smiths of Murano, although she has categorically turned down requests from abroad to work with other glassblowers. Her collaboration with the Venetian master Andrea Zilio and the two to four serventi of Fornace Anfora is very important to her — she considers it an indispensable condition for her work.

For many years her work has received international recognition and is represented in numerous private and public collections. Mishima won the Giorgio Armani Award from Sotheby's, London in 2001.
